
We have given evidence to the Senedd and Parliament on four occasions and been quoted in numerous reports during the year. Including on the impact of rising energy costs, the Welsh Government draft budget, the future of public leisure and Wales as a Tourism destination.

All of our advocacy work is independently funded through our commercial activity and partnerships.

Membership Plus

We delivered Membership Plus services to three members in advocacy, two members in communications and five members took on the finance package during the year to March 2023.

Demand for these services has been substantial and feedback from members taking them up has been very positive.

Due to sign up part way through the financial year, some income from these packages has been accrued into 2023-24.

The success of the Finance Plus service has resulted in a change of job role for one staff member who is now employed full-time as the Finance Officer, serving our members for 75% of their time.

Financial Performance,

The Association's activities are funded through a core grant from Sport Wales (48%) and commercial income (50%). The 2022/23 Sport Wales grant was £147,000.

(2021/22: £147,000)

Total income for the year was 2% less than budgeted, whereas expenditure for the year was 18% less than budgeted.

A saving of 8% was made on staffing costs due to the time between the outgoing CEO finishing and the incoming CEO starting.

The primary reason for this variation is due to the approval of a large deficit budget for the year, but a more conservative approach was latterly adopted following notice of the CEO departing and the transition to the new CEO.

The launch of Membership+, which generated £18,280 (6%) of new income was a success, despite being 39% less than the budgeted forecast.



Financial Performance

This revised strategy for the year resulted in the small profit (£6,638) against a large budgeted loss (£46,447)

The WSA outperformed our budget and returned a small surplus of £6,638 - this has been transferred to reserves in line with our reserves policy

WSA reserves increased to £103,614 from £96,976

Financial Performance

Going Concern

The company continues to expand its range of services and the directors believe that it is well placed to manage its business risks successfully.

Accordingly, they have a reasonable expectation that the company has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future and therefore they continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the financial statements.

During the reporting period, the directors reviewed and amended its reserve policy, agreeing more robust procedures and implemented a reserve level range between a minimum comfort level and a maximum comfort level, with a target in between.
